Jane Holcombe Harvey, State Recording Secretary~



I appreciate the opportunity to serve as recording secretary of South Carolina Society Daughters of the American Revolution. It is an honor to serve and at the same time it is a daunting responsibility to facilitate the recording of the history of SCDAR for the years of the Moffat Administration. In order to accomplish this every state officer and state chair must do her part in preparing reports to be sure that the minutes and the *Annual Proceedings* will be a true accounting of our work.

All state officers and state chairs are responsible for writing their reports in the DAR standard format and submitting them to the state recording secretary by the announced deadline. The details are covered in the State Information Packet. State Regent Moffat distributed an updated version of the National Society

Daughters of the American Revolution Style Guidelines published by the Office of the Recording Secretary General to each state officer and state committee chair this year. Those guidelines apply to the reports of the year's work that will be submitted at each Spring Conference. Please let me know if you need a copy of those guidelines.

Some salient points that assure our history is accurate and fairly recorded are:

- (1) keep a calendar of deadlines and meet those deadlines;
- (2) write all state reports in third person tense;
- (3) check your report for accuracy of simple things like dates, places, spelling of proper names, and word count. Reports not meeting these specifics or having questionable information will be returned for editing.

If your report exceeds the permitted word count it will be returned for editing. You are the only one who knows what is most important in your work so be certain you emphasize your reports to highlight the best in your area of service.

If giving an oral report, compose your report, practice and time your report. The timekeeper will do her job and all reports must fit the allotted time period as announced by the State Regent. It is most disappointing to not be able to present your entire report due to overreaching the allowed time.

Please be aware that due to pressing business matters at State Conference it can become necessary for the state regent to announce at the last minute that the time limits will be reduced. So, know what is most important in your report and be prepared to edit as needed, and edit quickly. (D.A.R. = Delete And Report? ... Just a little "recording secretary humor" in the midst of this dry article!)

I encourage you to give your SCDAR reports the same priority that you give to your commitment to DAR service. Keep good notes on your work so your report includes those important things being done in the name of South Carolina Daughters of the American Revolution. Help your state recording secretary publish the most accurate history of the Moffat Administration possible.

Congratulations Treasurers!

Your work over the last year was fantastic. Thank you for making my first year as State Treasurer fun and enjoyable. Meeting you all and making friends is the best part of my position.

It is that time of year that we need to start preparing for next fall. Some ideas that may help you stay ahead are:

- Magazine Ad Fund—This check needs to be made payable to SCDAR; however, they need to be given to your District Director. A good idea is to give this check to your Chapter Regent to take to the district meetings.
- Chapter Achievement Awards—To get credit for this award, chapters must donate \$100 towards either Historic Preservation, Patriotic Programs, Educational Programs, and/or Membership Training Programs. Chapters can split these categories evenly, give to just one, or any type of combination just as long as the total donation adds up to \$100. These funds must be in Washington on December 1st, not posted on December 1st. Therefore, I ask that you submit this to me early, but no later than November 15th.
- **Dues Collection**—Go ahead and start working on collecting the dues for next year. Put a plan together with your board, send out your dues collection forms, and start collecting early. It's much easier to start early and not panic when you realize it's November 29th and no one has paid.

Those are just some ideas that may help with scheduling for this year. Which reminds me, the forms for next year will be posted on the website after Continental Congress. Check it out when you get a chance. Just look under the Publications & Resources State Treasurer's Forms.

At Fall Forum this year we will have packages for each Treasurer. If you will not be able to attend our workshop, your package will be mailed to you. Please do not have someone else pick up your package.

You're usually the first DAR member a prospective member meets, so be enthusiastic, call them, and get to know them. Tell them that they need to obtain the documents for the first 3 generations (them, their parents, and grandparents). Be sure to tell them the cost of DAR membership so they won't be surprised. Once they're on the Prospective list, contact them every couple of months (see envelope to the right of prospective list – it is their email.)

They may stay on the prospective list for as long as you want. You never know what life events in which they are involved. You must change their status as various stages are reached. Once the application is sent to National, it takes about 3-4 weeks to be verified. It can be verified anytime, BUT they are official

once they receive their National Number on the 5th of each month. National will automatically transfer her name from the prospective list to chapter list. They later will receive a packet from National with their certificate of membership.

Member to member credit is NOW done by the registrar and it is found under updates.

Supplementals are entirely different. They are running up to 18 months to be verified and YOU must notify them as National DOES NOT. They only require two signatures – registrar plus the DAR individual submitting the application.

Here are a few more tips (now this may change with the new administration):

- 1. <u>Transfers request</u> are made by the <u>receiving chapter except to at large then the current chapter sends in the <u>form</u>. Transfer form is called "Membership change form" which is found under forms then Office of Organizing Secretary. Use this same form for change of <u>name or address</u>.</u>
- 2. Prospective list you add their data and must maintain it.
- 3. <u>Reinstatement</u> is a \$10 fee, but the form must be sent from the chapter treasurer with a dues remittance form.
- 4. <u>Associate membership</u> they must be a member in good standing of another chapter. Check your by-laws as each chapter determines the fee for that (\$10-15 usually). They are not counted in membership or for voting at meetings. Mostly they join because they have a genealogical interest in the area or have a family member in the chapter. If you do not have it in your by-laws, think about adding this.
- 5. <u>Anniversaries of membership</u> this is found under chapter reports on your chapter page on the left. Can print out the list but DO NOT wait until the month of to request the certificate for which the chapter pays. The application form is found under Forms/Office of Organizing Secretary last one "Years of Membership Certificate."

These are some of the questions that have been asked during the past year. Hope this helps. See you at Fall Forum in August.

In DAR service, it is not one size fits all. There are Service, Special, Genealogy, and Administrative Committees which provide many opportunities for Chapters and members to choose how they will serve their communities. There is no wrong way nor is there a requirement that an active Chapter must participate in every Committee.

As seeds are being planted for new organizing Chapters, remember that a growing membership allows more communities across the state to benefit from DAR service. A Chapter will receive 25 points on the Chapter

Achievement Awards (CAA) if it has members who transfer to an organizing Chapter <u>or</u> if <u>five</u> or more members transfer to revitalize a struggling Chapter with 20 or fewer members. Points aside, helping other Chapters grow makes us all grow stronger!

As we continue towards the National Society's goal of 250,000 members by our beloved America's 250th Anniversary, retention is vital, and your State Organizing Secretary is here to help, never more than a call, email, or text away.

Encouraging the involvement of all Members, including our Prospective Members, is essential, as we bring to fruition the service organization that was envisioned by the Founders, building upon the dedication and hard work of every Member who came before us!

For State Officers and committee chairs, if you are in possession of SCDAR property, it's required that you complete a State Property form for submission to the State Curator for inventory purposes.

Individual chapters are also required to create an inventory of their property that notes:

- the location
- person in possession
- insurable value
- · a photograph of the item

Property forms are available on the South Carolina DAR State website at https://cuboid-lily.squarespace.com/ property-forms or you may contact me directly (melissalevesque13@me.com) and I'll provide them to you.

Please plan on having all of these materials completed and sent to me by Fall Forum, 2022.

Maintaining chapter records is important for now and for future DAR researchers.

Resources to Learn About The Liberty Trail~

There were over 200 skirmishes and battles in South Carolina between 1779 and 1782. Called the Southern Campaign, these events led directly to an American victory in the Revolution. This history shall be called the Liberty Trail. Of the over 200 skirmishes, I have chosen 10 significant battle sites of concentration to highlight my State Regent's Project. Beginning in the Low Country at Fort Moultrie, moving to Dorchester, and Eutaw Springs, skirting the Midlands and Pee Dee to Camden, Waxhaws, and Kings Mountain to the Upstate at Cowpens, Blackstock, Musgrove Mill and ending at Ninety-Six. These Battlefields some already under conservation and preservation will be interpreted to tell South Carolina's role in the Revolutionary War. Working with the South Carolina Battleground Preservation Trust and the American Battlefield Trust many of these land sites have already been saved. Plans for conservation and interpretation have begun. The goal is to preserve America's hallowed battlegrounds and educate the public about what happened there and why it matters. A goal to keep alive the memory of our country's formative conflicts through a broad range of heritage tourism and education initiatives. Battlefields are after all outdoor classrooms, teaching young and old about the sacrifices made to secure the precious freedoms we enjoy today. Funds raised by my project will go directly to the SC Liberty Trail and be used to secure land for preservation instead of that land being sold to developers, thus lost forever.

President General Visits South Carolina—May 9-10, 2022

President General Dedicates Historic Marker in Old Exchange Building in Charleston, SC

"Father of the U.S. Cavalry" Michael Kovats de Fabriczy (often known as simply Michael Kovats—shown in image right) was a Hungarian nobleman and cavalry officer who served in the Continental Army during the American Revolution. Kovats was born in Karcag, Hungary, in 1724, and later served as a Hussar in Prussia, Poland and France before volunteering to fight on behalf of our Patriot ancestors. On Jan. 13, 1777, he wrote to American Ambassador to France Benjamin Franklin, offering his service. His letter concluded, "I have no wish greater than to leave forthwith, to be where I am needed most, to serve and die in everlasting obedience to Your Excellency and the Congress. Most faithful unto death, Michael Kovats de Fabricy." He would ultimately make that supreme sacrifice. When he fell in battle in Charleston, SC, on May 11, 1779, he and his horse were buried in an unknown location by the British victors, whose brigade commander praised Kovat's Legion as, "the best cavalry the rebels

On May 10, 2022, led by President General **Denise Doring VanBuren** a historical marker was dedicated at the Old Exchange and Provost Dungeon in Charleston, SC to honor Kovat's ultimate sacrifice, *see photo right*. The District VI Daughters hosted the ceremony and reception held upstairs in the Great Hall. The ceremony was also live streamed to Kovats birthplace in Hungary. Some photos from the event below.


While in Charleston, President General **VanBuren** toured a few of the historical attractions in Charleston. She wrote: "The South Carolina Daughters are famous for their hospitality—and we felt so fortunate to be the lucky beneficiaries of it tonight. We gathered on the eve of ceremonies to dedicate a historic marker in memory of Michael Kovats (considered one of two Fathers of the American Cavalry) on the Old Exchange, near the place of his death in the Battle of Charleston. We dined at the fabulous headquarters of the Washington Light Infantry, enjoying one another and a delicious meal of shrimp and grits."



Thanks to the efforts of **Lisa Cowan**, **Sally Gravino**, and **Nancy Walker**, the Wizard of Tamassee Chapter's design, shown right, will be the quilt square block for the State of South Carolina on the DAR's American 250! quilt.

Members of the Chapter's Historic Preservation Committee are: Chair Lisa Cowan, Sally Gravino, Nancy Walker, Teresa Rogers and Mari Noorai.

State Chair **Katherine Herndon Monahon** explained that the Chapter's quilt square "will become a part of the tapestry of our country's heritage."

The "Liberty Trail" quilt block design was developed by the collaborative Wizard of Tamassee American Heritage team of **Lisa Cowan** (Chair), **Sally Gravino** and **Nancy Walker**. The team's design goals were to visually communicate: 1) the State of South Carolina; 2) the role South Carolina played in the American Revolution; and 3) an impression of the peoples who inhabited and fought - on both sides - in South Carolina during the American Revolution.

Following a video presentation on the State Regent's project at a Wizard of Tamassee chapter meeting, the team was inspired to incorporate a modified version of South Carolina "Liberty Trail" (see note below) images into the America 250! quilt block design, in support of our State Regent's project commitment to raise \$25,000 for the Trail and related classroom educational materials.

The relevance of the Revolutionary War battles fought in South Carolina is owed to the people who fought on land and at the port city of Charleston. A key goal of the designers was to reflect the diversity of those who fought on both the Patriot and British sides of the American Revolution in South Carolina.

Two of the design team (Sally and Lisa) participate in the South Carolina Upstate Heritage Quilt Trail (UHQT.org), which paints impressions of the "storied" quilts that can be seen displayed on historic buildings, community centers, schools and private homes throughout the Upstate region.

The third design team member (Nancy) is a knowledgeable and experienced quilter who guided the feasibility of the design and who will assemble the fabric quilt block and appliqué work. Sally will then embroider the quilt block text and finishing touches.

The Sampit River begins in a swampy area of western Georgetown County, SC. It flows in an easterly direction to the Winyah Bay at Georgetown. Only small crafts can navigate the upper parts of the river. The lower river merges into the bay and is deepened by tidal flows, and (to Georgetown harbor) by dredging.

During colonial and antebellum years, areas near the river were developed extensively for rice cultivation, on large plantations dependent on labor of African slaves. They created complex earthworks with dams and other elements to irrigate the rice fields using tidewaters. In this and other areas of the Low Country, African Americans developed the Gullah people and culture, a distinct creole culture with strong connections through culture, language and cuisine to West African peoples.

Sumter's Home chapter is so very proud of each of these recipients as they are true preservationists, exemplifying the goals of the NSDAR Historic Preservation Committee.



The first medal was awarded to long-time Sumter historian Dr. Sammy Way, Curator (photo right) for creating and maintaining almost single handedly The Sumter County Military Museum located in the City of Sumter. He is a fervent historian of the area, and has collected all kinds of memorabilia to honor service



members in and outside of our community. The display was constructed to honor all veterans, regardless of place of birth, requiring only service

in the military. Neither lack of combat service nor being a Sumter native excludes veterans from entry into the display. The second medal was presented to chapter member and now Charleston Resident Anita Rosefield Roseburg, (photo right). The prestigious DAR recognition is for her longstanding life commitment to preservation and especially the Kahal Kadosh Beth Elohim Synagogue's (KKBE) Coming Street Cemetery in Charleston. Anita is the KKBE Past President, Co-Chair Coming Street Cemetery Restoration Committee, Member Historic Coming Street Cemetery Trust, and Co-Chair Archives-Museum-Fine Arts. "I am honored to receive such recognition from the DAR. I grew up in Sumter and will always consider Sumter my hometown. My ancestors were the organizing Charter Members of Sumter's Home Chapter DAR back in 1900 and I love that I can carry on their love of DAR as well as the DAR mission to Promote Historic Preservation," Anita said.



In addition, Historic Preservation Chapter Chair **Susan Saunders** announced that the Coming Street Cemetery preservation/restoration project has received for the third time an NSDAR Grant to help fund their next phase. Sumter's Home has sponsored the cemetery for all three successful Grant Applications during the past three NSDAR Administrations. According to the National Park Service, The Coming Street Cemetery, established in 1762, is the oldest Jewish burial ground in the South and possibly the nation. Privately owned by the KKBE Synagogue, the cemetery contains some 600 marble and brownstone grave markers. Most of the markers date to the last half of the 18th century or the first half of the 19th century, and include box tombs, tabletop tombs, obelisks, and columns. Many are significant examples of gravestone art, signed by locally prominent sculptors and stonecutters. A stuccoed brick wall surrounds the Cemetery, portions of which are original. An important feature of the site, this brick wall has been a major factor in preserving the intact cemetery over the past two century. Over time, some damage has occurred to individual gravestones from pollution, climate, severe weather and vandalism.



The chapter concluded their year with a "Picnic and Historical Day Tour to Edgefield, SC." Twenty members traveled to the area on May 4 for the daylong event, organized by Chapter member Lady Nicholson Hodges. The Tour began at Edgefield's Historic Joanne T. Rainsford Discovery Center Museum, where tour guide and local Historian Bettis C. Rainsford began the day with an overview of Edgefield's role in the history and settlement of South Carolina. He led the group through the Museum with commentary on the contents and history of the area. The Museum also houses Edgefield's "blackbox" Theatre, which presents a series of plays and history related performances throughout the year. The group moved to Historic Trinity Episcopal Church (photo above right) and

learned of those who founded the Church and were instrumental in its place within the community. Other sites visited were the Edgefield County Courthouse, a Robert Mills design, and its interior, where Mr. Rainsford gave an overview of the early legal community in Edgefield. A driving tour was enjoyed during the day of the area once called "Edgefield's Appian Way", with homes of early local and state leaders indicated. After touring the Edgefield "Square" in the center of town, the bus proceeded down a long and winding road to historic Horn's Creek Church (*photo right*), founded in 1768, and known to have been the site of many visits of the early Circuit Riders of the Great Reawakening of Religion in this country.

A delicious box lunch was served inside the church, restored in recent years by The Edgefield County Historical Society. Conversation, lunch and cool drinks were enjoyed in the cool, relaxed setting with time for tour members to view the interpretive panels describing the events in the area during the Revolutionary War, where a nearby field was the site of a skirmish of that period. The historic cemetery located here contains many graves of pioneers, revolutionary soldiers and founders of the county. The caretaker's cottage (*photo right*) offers a charming and important spot on the property, and its presence has helped eliminate the vandalism that had plagued the area for many years.

The tour bus viewed other historic sites on the return to "town", among them Oakley Park House Museum and Magnolia Dale,

headquarters of Edgefield County Historical Society. The tour concluded at "East Hill", the historic home of Judge and Mrs. **Hodges**, where the May meeting of the chapter concluded the day with the installation of the officers for the coming year. The fun day prompted one member to comment, "So much history here that I wish I had been born in Edgefield!"

Later in May, several William Capers members joined a tour of historic Fort Motte, South Carolina. Outgoing Regent, Mrs. **Paula LaMotte McCutchen**, her husband David McCutchen, Mrs. **Alice Caskey** and others enjoyed the day there.


The SCDAR District VI Annual Meeting will be held at Hopsewee Plantation in Georgetown on Saturday, July 30, beginning at 10 a.m.
