So, how does this job get accomplished and who helps? You do! Each member of SCDAR helps. Have you considered that your DAR work might, and often does, get published? It is a great system, and this officer is grateful for the flow chart that makes it happen.

Each chapter member and each chapter chair reports her work and accomplishments to her chapter and it is recorded in the chapter minutes. The

chapter regent uses the information in her chapter's minutes in several ways. She uses it to complete the Chapter Master Report and she also uses it to report the most outstanding achievements of her chapter to her District Director and to the Chair of the appropriate State Committee.

The District Directors and the State Chairs receive the reports from the Chapter Regents and choose the most impressive items to report at the State Conference where the State Recording Secretary gathers and files those reports and creates the minutes of the business meetings. From those minutes the Annual Proceedings are written and published.

Maybe one wonders why this is so important. Ladies, you are helping to record and preserve the history of the work of the South Carolina Society Daughters of the American Revolution! Reporting your work through the established channels is so important! Exclamation Point!

At Fall Forum each year the Annual Proceedings are distributed to all state officers and chapter regents. Members can also purchase a copy on the registration form for Fall Forum.



So, to enable the publishing of the best record for SCDAR please: Keep good records of chapter events & projects; Meet all deadlines; Follow all guidelines for reporting; Edit for accuracy (dates, spelling of names,

etc.); Emphasize the most important, inspiring and unique accomplishments.

So, now you know! Your DAR work in South Carolina is valuable, it is important to the mission of NSDAR, and it is preserved as a history of SCDAR.

Please do your part to make the record of the Moffat Administration accurate, complete, and sparkle!

I hope each of you are doing well and enjoying the summer break. There are some items that you need to be working on however, and Gina and I just want to make sure you are prepared.

First, a brief reminder about State Dues. Any new members who are <u>accepted</u> by national to your chapter on or after **July 5, 2023**, will be paying dues for the 2024 season. You do not send me their State Dues until you have collected the rest of your chapter's dues and mailed them to me before December 1, 2023. Once you have submitted your chapter's 2024 dues, any more new members accepted need to be mailed to me as well.

There are some chapters that have not submitted their late paying membership dues, their reinstated members, and/or their new member State Dues.

This is very important:

- 1. If you have not sent me the State Dues for your members who paid their 2023 dues late (after December 1, 2022), send them to me now.
- 2. If you have any reinstatements since you sent your State Dues to me in December 2022, and have not submitted the reinstated members State Dues, send those to me now.
- 3. If you have any new members since you submitted your chapter's State Dues for 2023 and you have not submitted the new members' State Dues, they are due now. Remember to check your new members each month and submit those State Dues timely.

Second, your magazine ad money will be due to your District Director soon. It is advisable to deliver the check to your director at your summer district meetings. Your Chapter Regent should attend that meeting and can deliver the check for you if you are not attending.

Third, there will be two Treasurers' Workshops at Fall Forum this year. One meeting will only be for you; no one else allowed including regents. The second meeting will be held for anyone else in the society to attend with their questions and your regents can attend this meeting.

Finally, if you are an incoming treasurer, welcome!! Gina and I are here to help guide you through the process and help you keep a financially healthy chapter. Please reach out to us via email or text anytime.

The other side of this coin is the outgoing treasurers. Thank you for your hard work, dedication, and willingness to support your chapter. Many people think the regent has a hard time, but truly, the treasurers have the toughest. It is a thankless job sometimes. Your final job is to remind your regent to update e-membership with the incoming treasurer and forward this letter to the new treasurer. You all are wonderful ladies and thank you again.

I wish you all a happy and safe summer and am looking forward to seeing you all at Fall Forum.

CHANGES AND UPDATES

Number one question I am asked is "where is the transfer form?" It is called "the membership change form" and it is found under forms – Office of Organizing Secretary. ONLY the receiving chapter must fill out the form which then is sent to national. The transfer can be done anytime but reinstatement is done on the 5th of the month and involves a special form from the treasurer and a \$10 fee for reinstatement.

<u>Image access</u> – one document in the database can be cited per application. Registrar has access to that.

<u>DOC – Daughters Online Community</u> is new, free, and has tons of information in response to the questions members have asked. The Communities correspond to committee so for genealogy you need to join the Lineage Research Committee. **Susan Johnston**, National Chair, will expertly answer your questions.

<u>Changes to supplementals</u> include only ONE YEAR to resolve an AIR letter instead of 2 for those supplementals submitted after 2/11/23.

A new Tier system will be used to rank them as to where in the verification process it will be placed as of June 28 at Continental Congress.

- Tier A 1 Easy ones that take less than 2 hours to verify
- Tier A 2 Supplementals that are for a new patriot or a new child
- Tier B excess documents, no documentation for service or residence, incorrect citations on page 3 or dates and places missing on page 2. They will be reviewed first week of the month. They may be returned along with your check if they have reasons listed above.

You do not need the death certificate, an obituary, and a tombstone to prove the death date. One is sufficient from the 4th generation on.

New as June 28, 2023, if you send in multiple supplementals (6) with one check in one envelope, if there is a problem with one, THEY WILL SEND ALL OF THEM BACK BECAUSE IT IS ONE CHECK.

I WOULD STRONGLY SUGGEST THAT YOU USE ONE CHECK PER SUPPLEMENTAL.

I know this is an imposition. But this would prevent your whole batch being sent back.

Joyce Scott will continue the "Freedom Lanterns for Veterans" at the annual Greer Freedom Blast & Military Salute event, held in Greer City Park the weekend before July 4th.

Behethland Butler is participating in Wreaths Across America (2 cemeteries) and we will have a great celebration of Constitution week in Travelers Rest in October and also is volunteering for the BBQ at Tamassee in June. Eight members are attending Continental Congress. They have just started a book club and are going to Richard Campbell Veterans Nursing Home in Anderson, SC in July.

Regina Luker from **Hudson Berry** was selected for the **America 250!** committee from her county. In conjunction with several other genealogical societies, they held a military appreciation ceremony at the Anderson County Museum, with about ninety people in attendance. Hudson Berry helped eight veterans receive a Quilt of Valor. It was announced that the chapter had been approved as location coordinators for Old Silverbrook Cemetery in Anderson, which is the first city cemetery.



Campbell Veterans Nursing Home.

The Walhalla Chapter will again sponsor the Tamassee DAR School Golf Tournament; host a reception at the annual Oconee County Memorial Day Ceremony; buy children's books for BabyRead, a local non-profit; send handmade baby blankets to overseas military bases; support a Junior American Citizens group in South Korea; supply Oconee Memorial Hospital Pediatric Unit with coloring books/crayons, etc; and collect aluminum can tabs for the Oconee County Blood Connection.

Fort Prince George will continue to identify Korea, Viet Nam and WWII vets to honor, expand the book club, renew the Dang doll it! party, and in December a "Let's do a Boston Tea party " to celebrate America 250! Fort Prince George members have been selected to work on the Pickens County America 250! Committee—Carolyn Nations as Committee Chair person, Harriet Nash as Secretary, Teresa Efant as Treasurer, Lynda Abegg, as publicity and historic entertainment.

In November, they will have The Blue Star Mothers come speak in honor of Veteran's Day and Armed Forces' Day. **Sheila Ingle** will speak in March for Women's History Month and we plan on scheduling a meeting at the Glenn Springs Historic Church and have someone from the Glenn Springs Preservation Society speak.

Daniel Morgan chapter continues its support of "Stars for Our Troops" and distributed over 300 stars and poems in small bags at the Cherokee County Memorial Day Service and Bell Ringing Ceremony. They presented the AFJROTC award to Cadet Meredith Aguilar at the Cadet Military Ball in April.

Each Veteran was presented with his quilt as chapter members helped display the quilt, wrap the Veteran in the quilt then give the Veteran a big hug. The chapter also plans to dedicate an America 250! marker at our Veterans Park in York at the same time.

District II will hold its annual district meeting on July 22 and will elect the nominees for the upcoming Director and Alternate Director positions for the 2024-2027 term.

Resources to Learn About The Liberty Trail~

There were over 200 skirmishes and battles in South Carolina between 1779 and 1782. Called the Southern Campaign, these events led directly to an American victory in the Revolution. This history shall be called the Liberty Trail. Of the over 200 skirmishes, I have chosen 10 significant battle sites of concentration to highlight my State Regent's Project. Beginning in the Low Country at Fort Moultrie, moving to Dorchester, and Eutaw Springs, skirting the Midlands and Pee Dee to Camden, Waxhaws, and Kings Mountain to the Upstate at Cowpens, Blackstock, Musgrove Mill and ending at Ninety-Six. These Battlefields some already under conservation and preservation will be interpreted to tell South Carolina's role in the Revolutionary War. Working with the South Carolina Battleground Preservation Trust and the American Battlefield Trust many of these land sites have already been saved. Plans for conservation and interpretation have begun. The goal is to preserve America's hallowed battlegrounds and educate the public about what happened there and why it matters. A goal to keep alive the memory of our country's formative conflicts through a broad range of heritage tourism and education initiatives. Battlefields are after all outdoor classrooms, teaching young and old about the sacrifices made to secure the precious freedoms we enjoy today. Funds raised by my project will go directly to the SC Liberty Trail and be used to secure land for preservation instead of that land being sold to developers, thus lost forever.







In support of the Battle Betty Foundation, the following narrative was submitted: The Battle of Cowpens Chapter, NSDAR of Spartanburg, SC nominates for Vivian's Outreach to Women (VOW) grant, The Battle Betty Foundation, providing the only women veteran's shelter (Lindsey Legacy Emergency Shelter) in the state of South Carolina. Their mission of commitment is "to empower Women Veterans as they navigate post-transition life by providing wrap around supportive services and resources." The grant request highlighted the greatest needs of the Foundation: medical care, educational improvement, job interviews, apartment searches, clothing, food, and child care—all these needs were based on the woman veterans ability to have transportation to reach and obtain services. The grant noted that "unfortunately, most of the referrals did not have a means of transportation to receive the services they require." The grant will provide a significant cost savings amount per veteran realized by the foundation and a means of transportation will be available to the women veterans in the area who are served.

SCDAR Camden Battlefield—America 250! Marker

HISTORY OF THE BATTLE OF CAMDEN

The Battle of Camden was an unbalanced victory for the British during the American Revolutionary War. Despite many Continental forces with dysentery, General Horatio Gates chose to engage British General Cornwallis's forces on the morning of August 16, 1780. The illness had depleted General Gates's advantage, and the British brutally engaged the Continentals in bayonet warfare. Improperly equipped to stave off the British forces, most Continentals ran away resulting in heavy losses of Patriots killed or taken prisoner and heavy losses of artillery. The heavy loss cost General Gates his command and was replaced by Nathanael Greene.



The Patriot loss at the Battle of Camden remains one of the worst defeats in American military history. Camden Battlefield became the final resting place for approximately 1,000 Patriot forces and 350 Continental soldiers. The pine forest became a hallowed final resting place for many, never to be forgotten. In less than one month, 14 individuals recently discovered on the sacred battlefield will be honored with a respectable re-interment to rest with those they fought amongst and against forever more. To be remembered forever for their greatest sacrifice in the forging of this Nation.

To all who pause in this place, may this marker make effective the voice of the memorial. May it remind us of those whose service to country and heroic sacrifices aided and advanced the cause of independence. In remembering the past, we honor the men and women who gave their lives for the preservation of our freedoms and our future.

But what was I to do with them? I got the idea that if I sold them to members of the DAR we could purchase a tree in her name at Tamassee DAR School. Marilyn and her husband, Lenair, were great supporters of Tamassee. I contacted the CEO of Tamassee, The Rev. Jon Holland, and he loved the idea. I had only met Marilyn and Lenair one time. But during the time that I spent selling her pins I learned so much about Marilyn. Not only did other SCDAR state officers want to purchase her pins, but they were also honored to wear her pins and they didn't just pay the asking price, they made donations. They all told me about how Marilyn had impacted their lives, mentored them, and how much

they loved her. On May 15 the Winyah Chapter hosted a memorial dedication ceremony to Marilyn at Tamassee DAR School with a tree and a marker. Former SCDAR State Regents **Dianne Culbertson** and **Dot Lind** who were close friends of Marilyn's attended and shared memories of Marilyn. Marilyn was a truly wonderful DAR role model. We started with a memorial service, followed by lunch. Then we gathered at the site of the tree and plaque. A tour of the campus by golf carts ended the day.


Fort Sullivan Chapter Wins Historic Preservation Committee National Second Place Award




